### **TOUR OF THE HISTORICAL/CULTURAL/POLITICAL SITES OF THE CITY OF LONDON**

#### **The Guildhall and Crypts**

As the home of the Corporation of London, Guildhall has been the centre of City government since the Middle Ages. The present Guildhall was begun in 1411 and, having survived both the Great Fire of London and the Blitz, it is the only secular stone structure dating from before 1666 still standing in the City.

The Guildhall take bookings 6 weeks in advance. The visits include a tour of the crypts. They can accommodate 40-50 people and there is no charge.

#### **Central Criminal Court**

The Central Criminal Court, universally known as the Old Bailey, is the most famous criminal court in the world. It has been London's principal criminal court for centuries. The original Old Bailey courthouse was built in 1539 but the history of the court goes back much further as the site has been occupied by the notorious Newgate gaol in medieval times.

#### **Monument**

Built to commemorate the Great Fire, the Monument offers panoramic views over London. Visitors can climb the spiral staircase of 311 steps to the balcony where there are breathtaking views over the city in all directions.

Monument is open from 10am-6pm daily and costs £1.50 per adult.

#### **St Pauls Cathedral**

Built by Sir Christopher Wren in 1710 the majestic Cathedral is open from Monday – Saturday 8.30am-16.00.

#### **Tour of the Globe Theatre**

Shakespeare's Globe Exhibition is the most exciting place to explore Shakespeare's theatre and the London where he lived and worked. It is the world's only permanent exhibition dedicated to the conditions under which Shakespeare's plays were first written, performed and published.

#### **Optional visits**

- **Visit to the Tate Modern - entrance to the permanent exhibition is free of charge. There is an excellent café/restaurant on the top floor for lunch**
